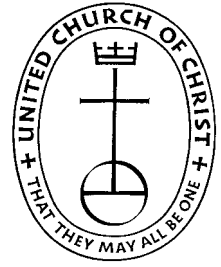

Church Financial Update through May 2009

At the January Congregational Meeting, I agreed to periodically update the congregation on the church's finances. Through the first five months of the year, our Expenses have begun to exceed our Income.

Table 1 shows the budgeted income and expenses vs. the actual income and expenses through May including both General Operating and Outreach (Mission) budgets. Subtracting the Actual Expenses of \$217,005 from the Actual Income of \$214,804 yields a deficit of \$2,201. Due to reduced expenses and increased giving, this is better news than what was expected at this point in the year but we need to continue

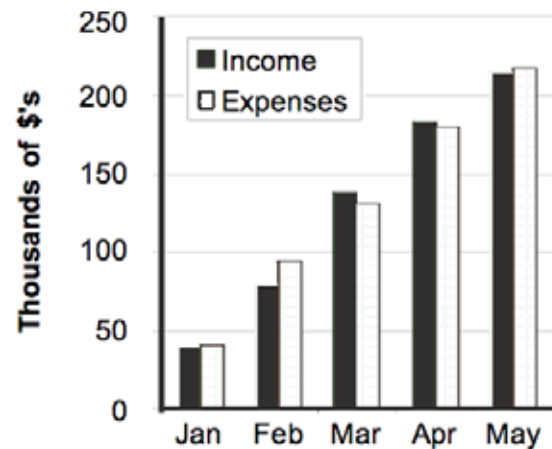
our generous giving through the Summer vacation months (when attendance and giving typically tapers off) to avoid an even larger deficit by Fall.

The chart is a more visual representation of our finances. It shows the cumulative income and expenses from month to month through May. A large increase in income in March and April helped off-set our expenses.

Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT) and your pledge

I'd like to remind you that you can have your pledge deducted automatically from your Checking or Savings account via Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT). My family gives this way so we know that our contribution to God and Lake Edge comes first and is given regularly; even when we are out of town.

Here are a few benefits of giving via EFT:

- Offers a convenient way to give
- Simplifies making and fulfilling stewardship commitments
- Strengthens your regular participation in the ministry of the church
- Gives priority to giving to God
- Ensures you don't miss a pledge payment even if you can't attend church each week
- It costs nothing to sign up for this program and you can cancel at any time by notifying the church office

It benefits Lake Edge...

- Steadies our cash flow
- Reduces borrowing or dipping into reserves during vacation seasons
- Helps us forecast contributions
- Reduces work for volunteers and office staff (no one needs to count your contribution, bring it to the bank or enter it into your giving account)
- Is secure, accurate and efficient

One concern you may have (I did when I first signed up) was how can you participate in the offering of gifts during the worship service if you give via EFT? We provide cards that state "I give electronically" that you can pick up at the back of the sanctuary and put into the offering plate.

Please consider giving via EFT. Contact the church office for more information on how this works, to get your questions answered and to pick up an authorization form to get your electronic giving started.

I'd like to thank all of you who have contributed to the life and ministry of Lake Edge and ask that you continue your generous support throughout the year.

9:00 Worship Planning Team

Our 9:00 service is referred to as our "traditional" worship service. A 'tradition' is a custom or practice that is rooted in the past. In the case of our worship, it means a worship service that is rooted in the history not only of Lake Edge, but also in the long history of our faith. However, traditional does not mean unresponsive or unchanging, and, in fact, the worship of our God can never be either of those.

In response to concerns offered by members of Lake Edge, the Board of the Diaconate has established a 9:00 Worship Planning Team. The charge to the team is to honor our long-standing traditions and practices, our roots, while simultaneously thinking in new ways about all aspects of the worship service, and then to work with the Pastors and the Director of Music to creatively plan vital worship services for 9:00 on Sunday morning.

How the coming years of pastoral transitions will affect the team and its work cannot be predicted. However, the team feels strongly that the congregation knows, from the beginning, who we are, what our charge is, and that we welcome and encourage feedback and comments. We have read and discussed the nine signs of vital and faithful worship described in Thomas Long's book "*Beyond the Worship Wars*"

(stay tuned to future issues of the Chimes for more about these signs) and have begun with a small change to the start of worship, or rather to what we do before we even start the Order of Worship. We can never be "done" or "have it right," because in the worship of our God we will always be listening and responding.

Heart and Soul From Your Parish Nurse

For Our Bodies: *"You don't have to cook fancy or complicated masterpieces – just good food from fresh ingredients."*

– Julia Child

Ginger (the spice, not Fred Astaire's dance partner) with its tangy taste and medicinal properties is a fresh ingredient that has been enjoyed by humans for nearly 3000 years. About 2000 years ago, the Romans began importing it from China, but its use wasn't really widespread until Marco Polo made his journey to Asia in the 13th century.

If you haven't tried cooking with fresh ginger, you might want to consider taking the plunge. You'll find it in the produce section of your grocery store. It is a rhizome (a stem that grows under the ground), and is brown and knobby looking like a root. Choose one with smooth, not wrinkled skin. One thing to keep in mind: the more knots or branches it has, the more pungent it will be.

To use, just peel, then slice or grate. The peppery, pungent, slightly sweet flavor is fairly concentrated, so a little bit will go a long way. Of course, ground ginger is also available, but it's important to remember that ground and fresh ginger have distinctly different flavors and are not considered interchangeable in cooking.

"What the science says. Studies suggest that the short-term use of ginger can safely relieve pregnancy-related nausea and vomiting, but studies are mixed on whether ginger is effective

for nausea caused by motion, chemotherapy, or surgery. It is unclear whether ginger is effective in treating rheumatoid arthritis, osteoarthritis, or joint and muscle pain." -- The National Institute of Health

Interested in trying a tea for its possible medicinal effects? Place a few ginger slices in a tea strainer and steep in boiled water for about 10 minutes, then add honey to taste. There are also plenty of ginger teas available in the grocery store. Richard's Story: Diapers, Dimples and Transformation

Richard, an 80-something member of a buddy church, tells of the following experience: In the communications flurry the week before our "Buddy" dinner of Tuesday evening, I, as team leader, learned of a need for "pull-up" diapers. Though I didn't know what they were, I went to make the purchase, only to discover they are color coded for boys and girls. Wearer's gender finally determined and diapers stocked, I thought to deliver them along with the Tuesday meal. An urgent call, however, woke me from a late Sunday nap with a frantic plea, "Where are the diapers?" My thoughts on the beltline drive from the west side were less than charitable, since there's a source close to church. When no one was there to receive the package, I felt a bit awkward and slightly miffed—until, in the midst of my self-centered pique, an unlikely angel appeared for me.

Someone—a quite small someone whose head barely cleared my knee—looked up mutely and held aloft the gift bag he had just received. He made it obvious he couldn't untie the ribbon at the top and wanted my help. I found myself on the floor, sitting with this little boy leaning on my leg as I struggled with child-proof plastic and twisty ties holding the little cars he so treasured. As I was able to free each, he'd flash a big smile (there must have been dimples,) go "rmm, rmm," with it, and watch intently for the next. It was then that I realized both of us were receiving gifts as together we opened his prizes; his, the toys and mine, the recognition that the joy and peace we experience through such small acts of service ultimately come from our Lord and Savior.
