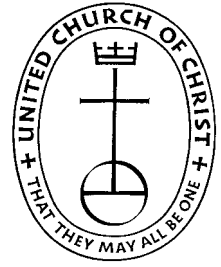

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## From the Senior Pastor

I am very pleased to have served now for seven weeks at Lake Edge. The time is flying by. There is work we need to do together before a search committee is appointed. I can imagine that this news may be a little discouraging. After all the turnover in staff these last four years, you may be anxious for a search committee to get going right away to choose the next settled pastor for LEUCC. Many of you have spoken to me about the need for a settled pastor who will stay for at least seven years, and maybe more. But for that to happen, the process for the search must be conducted carefully and thoughtfully. Although the search committee is being organized now, there are things we can do as a whole church to help them prepare the search.

The first thing we can do is to discover who we are as LEUCC. This may seem like a nebulous question. After all, this is a large congregation. There are many opinions about every topic we might discuss. Nonetheless, there are undoubtedly things we can say about the characteristics that make LEUCC unique. Beyond the obvious fact of our size, what else might we say?

The Cabinet will be providing the forums for this and other conversations. In the future, you can expect to be invited to listening sessions and, perhaps, to fill out a survey. I encourage each one of us to engage fully in these efforts of self-definition. If we do this work well, the search committee will have the information it needs to do a proper job of finding the right candidate for this congregation.

I'm convinced that the right match will be happen. I have found this congregation to be open, receptive, interested in new ideas, and happy to reflect on its past. In other words, this church is made up of very fine people who are committed to serving God the best you are able to do so.

Take heart! The work of finding the next pastor has begun. With patience and concerted effort that new pastor will be here before we know it!

### **From the 9:00 Worship Planning Team**

Signs of Vital and Faithful Worship:

- Make room somewhere in worship for the experience of mystery
- Make planned and concerted efforts to show hospitality to the stranger
- Have recovered and made visible the sense of drama inherent in Christian worship
- Emphasize congregational music that is both excellent and eclectic in style and genre
- Creatively adapt the space and environment of worship
- Forge a strong connection between worship and local mission that is expressed in every aspect of the worship service
- Maintain a relatively stable order of service and a significant repertoire of worship elements and responses that the congregation knows by heart
- Move to a joyous festival experience toward the end of the service
- Have strong, charismatic pastors as worship leaders (from *Beyond the Worship Wars* by Thomas Long, 2001)

Last month we briefly described the first two signs of vital and faithful worship. Before going on to the next signs, you may have wondered what Long means by vital and faithful worship. By ‘vital’ Long means exactly that, a worship service that is alive and growing. By faithful, he means worship that remains true to the “great worship heritage of the church.” Very similar to our definition of the 9:00 traditional service – rooted in the traditions of Lake Edge and the Christian faith, but responsive to our Stillspeaking God.

### **Have recovered and made visible the sense of drama inherent in Christian worship**

Long states that drama is inherent in our worship, but then quickly warns us of the dangers of making worship into a spectacle or entertainment by adding skits. So what does he mean? Long makes two points, the first is that the drama in worship comes from the dramatic in Scripture. Part of worship is a retelling and re-enactment of the biblical story – we don’t make worship dramatic, we allow the drama already present to be seen. The second manner in which we can think about drama

is to think of the entire service as a play or piece of community theater. The mistake people make when thinking of worship this way is that we tend to think of the congregation as the audience in the pews with the ‘actors’ on the stage. On the contrary, God is the audience and we, the entire congregation, are the actors. The words, scripture, prayers, and hymns are the script and our movement is the choreography. Worship isn’t something that happens to us, or that we go watch. Worship is a verb (and also the title of a book by Robert Webber). Worship is something we do, and should involve every part of every one of us and all of our senses. It is not a showcase for performers. God wants all his children in the play.

### **Emphasize congregational music that is both excellent and eclectic in style and genre**

We’ve got the first part of this sign covered. We have a congregation that likes to sing and though the choir is small, it’s excellent. The handbell choir is excellent and our musical leaders are also excellent (Ben, Kathy, Jeanne). On the other hand, there is no other issue around worship that is more divisive than music style. Everyone has their favorite music and many folks also have their favorite worship music. In fact, some churches offer services where you can literally pick the music style – rock, bluegrass, classical, jazz, new age, etc. But that’s not what Long means by eclectic in style and genre. Vital worship, in contrast, has it all, at appropriate times. No one, including Long, would deny that music is a key element in our worship, but remember that we do not come to hear the music. We come to worship. Long cautions against blended worship where there is a mix of music at every service. The goal is to have the music fit and supplement the worship, not vice versa. There is a place for both old and new songs. The Psalms are old and in general, traditional hymns are more similar to the Psalms in complexity, range of topics, and ratio of praise to petition than are most contemporary worship songs. However, the Psalms also tell us to change it up once in awhile and sing a new song to the Lord (Psalms 33, 96, 98, 149). Planning music for a vital worship service takes an ongoing commitment of resources both in terms of time and money. It also asks the congregation to practice an ethic of engagement and tolerance. Some people may struggle with the hymns and others may wrestle with a new or different style. We are asked to open our hearts, set aside our prejudices, listen deeply and show the Christian qualities of acceptance, understanding and love. If we don’t engage with what makes us uncomfortable, we rarely move, and worship should definitely move us. It’s a verb, after all.

## Volunteers Needed for the Lake Edge Website

Many in our faith community tell us we have one of the best, most up-to-date church websites they have seen. With your help, we can keep it that way and make it even better. Yes, YOU can be a big help to the website team even if you don't know web programming. We use menu-driven software to update the website, so “non-techies” can learn how to point and click to update stuff anytime from your home computer. Of course, we need people with technical skills, too! Three ways to help:

- 1) If you coordinate or lead church activities, committees, or events, you can get a username and password and a short training so that you can post your own events and update your own church web pages. Even someone with very limited computer skills can learn how to point and click to make simple changes to just your own stuff.
- 2) Join our Content Crafters Team of non-techies and use our menu-driven software to post events and keep web pages up-to-date. A reasonably computer-savvy person can easily learn the software. You can make a very valuable contribution to church life on your own schedule from your home computer by helping with regularly-scheduled, straightforward projects such as transferring the information from the Chapel Chimes and eNews to the website, helping church activity leaders get their information online, copy editing, and posting news. Chief Non-Techie Amanda Helm really needs help with the constant updating. Creativity is also welcome to help make the website more fun, gathering photos and quotes and jazzing up our pages.
- 3) Join our Techies Team of skilled computer programmers to maintain and expand the content-management software and framework of the site so the non-techies can do their work posting the actual information. Chief Techie Ken Hahn could really use some help! Familiarity with Drupal is especially helpful. Eventually, we'd like to offer cool features like an online member directory, online library catalog, photo swap section, and work areas for boards and teams.
